1. Application

- 1.1 An application for a Premises Licence Variation, has been received from Ice Arena (Wales)
 Limited in respect of Ice Arena Wales, Olympian Drive, Cardiff Sports Village Cardiff, CF11
 0JL.
- 1.2 The current conditions attached to the Premises Licence:
 - (1) In respect of the following licensable activities:
 - 1. The sale by retail of alcohol for consumption on the premises.
 - 2. The provision of regulated entertainment in the form of plays, films, indoor sporting events, boxing or wrestling entertainment, live music, recorded music, performances of dance and anything of a similar description.
 - 3. The provision of late night refreshment.
 - Unless otherwise indicated the premises may be open to the public during the following hours and for any hours consequential to the non standard timings:

Sunday to Friday: 06:00 to 02:00

Saturday: 06:00 to 06:00 the following day

New Years Eve: from the end of permitted hours New Years Eve to start of permitted

hours New Years Day.

- (3) The premises are permitted to provide licensable activities during the following hours:
 - 1. The sale by retail of alcohol for consumption on the premises:

Sunday to Wednesday: 10:00 to 00:00 Thursday to Saturday: 10:00 to 02:00

New Years Eve: from the end of permitted hours New Years Eve to start of permitted

hours New Years Day.

2. The provision of regulated entertainment in the form of plays (indoors):

Monday to Sunday: 11:00 to 00:00

3. The provision of regulated entertainment in the form of films (indoors):

Monday to Sunday: 06:00 to 01:00

4. The provision of regulated entertainment in the form of indoor sporting events:

Monday to Sunday: 06:00 to 00:00

5. The provision of regulated entertainment in the form of boxing or wrestling entertainments (indoors):

Monday to Sunday: 10:00 to 00:00

6. The provision of regulated entertainment in the form of live music (indoors):

Monday to Sunday: 11:00 to 23:00

New Years Eve: from the end of permitted hours New Years Eve to start of permitted hours New Years Day.

7. The provision of regulated entertainment in the form of recorded music (indoors):

Sunday to Wednesday: 06:00 to 01:00 Thursday to Saturday: 06:00 to 02:00

New Years Eve: from the end of permitted hours New Years Eve to start of permitted

hours New Years Day.

8. The provision of performances of dance (indoors):

Monday to Sunday: 10:00 to 00:00

New Years Eve: from the end of permitted hours New Years Eve to start of permitted

hours New Years Day.

9. The provision of late night refreshment (indoors):

Sunday to Wednesday: 23:00 to 01:00 Thursday to Saturday: 23:00 to 02:00

New Years Eve: from the end of permitted hours New Years Eve to start of permitted

hours New Years Day.

1. 4 The following application for variation is now made.

To vary the licence to include the sale by retail of alcohol for consumption off the premises to allow alcohol consumption in a pre-determined area outside on the plaza area.

2. Promotion of Licensing Objectives.

2.1 The additional conditions proposed by the applicant to meet the licensing objectives are attached to the report.

3. Relevant Representations

Representations have been received in respect of the application, copies of which are enclosed with the report.

4. <u>Legal Considerations.</u>

- 7. Text/Radio pages will continue to be used for the additional hours of trading and will be monitored by a responsible member of staff
- 8. There will be regular ID checks at the premises and the venue will only accept photographic driving licenses, passport or in agreement with the police a form of identification with the PASS hologram
- 9. Regular liaison with the police
- 10. All instances of crime and disorder will be reported to the police and kept in an incident log book which will be monitored
- 11. Any illegal drugs and weapons found will be stored in a secure facility and arrangements made with the venue for their delivery to the police

I have caused enquiries to be made into this application. The premises has been the subject of a site visit and the application has been discussed with the applicant.

The application relates to the variation of the existing premises licence to allow the off sale of alcohol and the use of a designated external seating area.

The Police object to the granting of this variation on the basis of crime and disorder, public safety and that of public nuisance.

The following conditions are therefore requested and relate to the use of the external area specified by the applicant. Should the applicant agree to these conditions then the Police will withdraw their objection.

I The use of the external area will cease at 20:00 daily.

The use of the external area will cease for a period of three hours before the commencement of any event held at the venue. Examples of such an event are Cardiff Devils home games, any other sporting event including boxing events and any musical event. The DPS must consult with the Police no less than 28 days before any such event is due to take place to avoid any doubt.

3 There will be no off sales on those days when an event as outlined above is being held at the venue.

Re. Ice Arena Wales - Premise licence applications

I write to you as a representation towards a local premise licence application for the Ice Arena Wales, Cardiff international sports village.

I would not usually take much consideration against items such as these but as a developing area that is set to receive further housing residential development i feel that it is imperative that consideration is given towards the consent to the application.

I have read the guidelines and will be making my representation in line with all 4 of the licensing objectives as below:

- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- · Public safety;
- · The prevention of public nuisance;
- The protection of children from harm.

these are my points for consideration;

• The prevention of crime and disorder - we, as residents to the locality currently experience on game days an extremely high volume of cars, traffic and walking visitors. These visitors at present limited to sensible time arrangements and the lack of further alcohol congestion can be expected in regard to an area that is deemed a sports location. What i can say that with an increase in alcohol and extended opening times to what can only be described as ridiculous (530am) it will increase the probability of drunken misbehaviour, criminal damage as people return to their cars or homes on foot which directly effects us already with the visitors bringing there own alcohol i assume. The area is commonly scattered with the latest craze of nitrous oxide gas canisters which increase following the occasions that games or events are held. Certain events that we have experienced to date such as the boxing left littering (Public Safety) which even to date remnants remain in outlying areas.

When you consider **The protection of children from Harm**, the area is frequented with children from an extremely young age group or people who have physical or mental disabilities due to its direct correlation with not only the visitors it brings but the swimming pool that it neighbours. This application asking for alcohol consumption and extended hours to very early hours will compound the left bottles etc. With early starts at the pool being as early as 6am, this in my mind is a complete overlap of very differing types of public and creating a clash that should not be expected in mind of public safety. It is running proof that the littering and abscence to control nuisance car noise from revelling horn blows (**prevention of public nuisance**) etc at the times that they are already restricted to will become worse with extended permisions as they have applied for.

As a resident already suffering from the lack of control and regard for its neighbours in relation to the events held at Ice Arena wales i would like my claims to be taken seriously,

we often have abandoned vehicles on all footpaths and even the roundabout where it seems the Ice arena take no responsibility for its visitors and their actions and the impact that it has on the residents at large.

These additional requests from the Arena seem to be directed as an inhouse bar area that can serve alcohol until 530 am weekends and 2 am in the week, any and all other activities that it has applied for finish no later than 2 am (Live Music), i dont deem the option of then staying to drink on for a further 3.5 hours will be a benefit to anyone other than the purse strings of the arena and will leave the car parks that surround a policing issue to say the least with public nuisance an obvious concern.

I suggest that the Hours applied for be reconsidered and i would like to see what plans are in place for self policing of litter and nuisance behaviour and what noise consideration has been allowed.

I know that i will not be the only resident with concern and trust that in mind of the developing area to home many new residents over the coming years you will consider the impact of what can only be described as nightclub opening times and considerations.

I am writing with concerns about the impact of extended hours until 5am for consumption on and off the premises.

As a local resident, my concern is what 'off the premises' actually means.

We do not have objections to on the premises because the noise impact will not affect us but in any circumstance I hope you will make it clear that when large events are held (e.g boxing) that Ice Arena Wales makes sure that there are adequate temporary bins which are managed on the night.

The existing bins in the immediate vicinity do not cope with bottles etc and the bins overflow and cans and bottles get left and blown around to our back doors. This not only affects resident in the Cardiff Pointe development but makes the area look dreadful to visiting tourists etc so will undoubtedly impact on Cardiff City's image.

Please make it a condition of any licence that the recycling of waste happens on the night not two or three days after.

Dear Licensing Section, City of Cardiff Licensing Authority

I write in opposition to the extent of the licensing hours request by IAW (Ice Arena Wales), and attach a photographic version of the specific notice on display, on the following grounds:

There is an existing issue with parking in which visitors to IAW/attendees of ice hockey games park in areas, including unlit areas, that are either not allocated IAW parking, that is in areas that are public access rather than private, but also wherever there is space in areas that are reserved/restricted and private, like those that are designated Cardiff Pointe/Figurehead Homes development land and parking areas.

In any event, the licence as stated is not accurate. For example, in asking for hours on Thursday and Friday extending to 0200 on the following day, and beyond midnight on Saturday to 0530 on Sunday, the proper request should be for two periods on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, so for example Sunday 0001 to 0530 and 1000 to 0000.

In the absence of any local off licence, it hardly seems appropriate for IAW to attempt to fill this role at all under any circumstances, let alone on a permanent basis. If there is reasonable justification for sales by a sporting and exercise facility to sell liquor for off site consumption, it should be as an interim measure to be rescinded as soon as an off licence business is open for business, assuming that the City of Cardiff considers that the consumption of alcohol does not conflict with the ethos of sport, health and fitness.

Games are always concluded by 2200 hours, so it seems excessive to allow, nor does there seem to be any reasonable necessity for the sales of alcoholic beverages beyond 0000.

The possibility of tailgate parties and drinking alcohol in the vicinity beyond 0000 hours poses a noise and other nuisance risk to residential interests in the vicinity, as well as a risk from broken glass bottle, discarded drink containers, accidental collisions with the vehicles of residents and other IAW visitors resulting from miscalculation and misjudgment by alcohol impaired drivers, as well as the risk of altercations.

Unless the City of Cardiff and IAW agreed jointly on the need for and provision of a police presence, and accept to jointly fund such presence, then it seems wise to restrict a liquor sales licence to on premises consumption to not beyond midnight,

and to restrict off site consumption sales, on the temporary basis described above, to 2200 hours.

It is my understanding that a six star hotel is planned to be built in the near vicinity, and this hotel will also no doubt have the right to sell liquor, but will almost certainly have their own security to take account of the cost of rooms, and the kind of guests they will hope to attract, so again the extensive hours requested by IAW seem unnecessary in addition to being unwise. In this way, those who have a need for extended alcoholic beverage drinking hours will soon have both a place to drink, and there will be a security presence to prevent the kinds of concerns I have outlined.

I urge you to consider adopting substantially what I have recommended here.

I commend this objection to your best judgement.



With regard to the above TENS submitted for an event to be held at the Cathays Community Centre.

The event is a sixth form party to be held on the premises on the evening of Saturday 28th October 2016. Numbers requested at the event are 250.

I have spoken to the organiser, Jasper Gaskin, 18yrs and a representative of the premises, Joel Beswick.

Mr Gaskin has applied for 250 persons to attend but the premises licence stipulates a maximum of 200 persons and the submitting officer is concerned that the event may have already have been oversubscribed.

I am informed that the premises is allowing the organisers to run their own bar selling alcohol at the event. The organiser Jasper Gaskin informs me that persons running the bar will be carrying out their own ID checks.

There is no provision for security at the event and neither could provide satisfactory answers when asked what provision is made for persons, potentially underage, attending the event intoxicated and how they see their duty of care to these persons.

I have tried again this morning to speak to the organiser and the premises, without success.

Having had these conversations I am not satisfied that there are sufficient measures in place to prevent the sale of alcohol to under age persons at this event and therefore I therefore objecting to the granting of this TENS under the following licensing objectives;

Prevention of harm to children,

Public safety/Public nuisance,

Prevention of crime and disorder.
