Flag Reports: 9 incidents: 5 x safeguarding, 4 x ASB/offence

Context: Waiting to be assessed for ADHD and ASD, 4+ ACEs including DV and parental substance misuse. Has recently become a CLA (sec 76) with bail conditions not to return home. A lot of these flag incidents are connected to him becoming CLA.

Reflections: YP struggled with becoming CLA but still managed to attend the majority of all the football activities

YP voice: YP shared that he really enjoyed CCFC and it was the only consistent thing he had going throughout summer throughout and all of the placement moves. YP shared that he would have attended more football activities if there were more.

Context: YP is CLA, living with sister. SEN statement and suspected ASD. Has 4 or more ACEs **Reflections:** Could have got more involved with summer if he was encouraged, enjoyed the one session he did attend. Has moved through workers – Connor, Geraint and now Carol.

Engaged in summer activities: 13 activities / 17 sessions: Wicketz (1/8, 12/8, 18/8, 22/8), Cycling (3/8, 31/8), Cooking (5/8), Kayaking (8/8), Big Pit, Badminton (10/8), Aqua Park (11/8), Pottery (11/8), Fishing (18/8), Outdoor theatre (24/8), Cycling (26/8), Beach (30/8), Gocarting (2/9)

Other professional summer engagement: No contact with SW over summer, 1 contact every two weeks from CM

Flag Reports: 3 incidents: 3 x safeguarding

Context: Being assessed for Bi Polar and ADD. Struggles in school, is a kinaesthetic learner and Mum argues he does not get his needs met, in the process of being placed on alternative education of school two days and college for three. Family being evicted from family home of 18 years due to landlords request, family are not at fault, family have no where to go and are waiting to be officially homeless before being placed into emergency accommodation — multiple court proceedings due to this. Parental separation, still has contact with Father. One parent has mental health difficulties.

Reflections: YP wanted to be a involved in all YJS activities, looked forward to his days being occupied. Always said yes to activities. Is continuing to engage with staff to transition him out of summer, from the intensive support received over summer.

YP voice: Told CM he had a brilliant time, asked if they could do it all again and asked how they could remain connected to YJS to continue to work with staff.

YP told intervention team its 'been the best summer ever'.

YP also proudly told staff they have not been trouble all summer because they have engaged with YJS summer programme.

Reflections

Partnership Working

- **Prevention:** 50% of YP engaged in Summer Programme were Prevention cases.
- **Females:** An additional 13 females with Divert. How are Divert supporting?
